STATE LIVESTOCK NOMINATION INFORMATION

The state livestock nomination season has arrived! In 2022, we transitioned to an online nomination system, which will continue.

It is going to be <u>IMPERATIVE</u> for you to plan ahead! You will not be able to wait until the last minute and successfully complete the nomination process.

Moving to an online system helped streamline the process from nomination, to entry, through participation in the state shows. Both steps will continue to be required – complete nomination and show entry. Additionally, the deadlines have not changed and will continue to be enforced. You will have to submit your information online, through ShoWorks, and postmark your completed and signed DNA envelopes by the appropriate date. Then, after your nominations are complete and have been verified, you'll submit your official show entries directly through the specific show in which you would like to participate – the Kansas State Fair Grand Drive and/or KJLS.

4-Step State Nomination Process:

- 1. Purchase Official DNA Envelopes. Only DNA envelopes ordered after 2022 will be accepted.
- 2. Enter Animal & Exhibitor Data through Online System (ShoWorks) by Nomination Deadline.
- 3. Mail Completed DNA Envelopes & Copy of Online Submission Receipt by Nomination Deadline.
- 4. Online Approval by Extension Agents (4-H) & FFA Advisors (FFA).
- *Nomination Only Makes Animals Eligible A complete nomination does NOT constitute show entry. Nominations make market animals or commercial breeding females eligible to be entered and shown in the Kansas State Fair Grand Drive and/or KJLS. After completing the nomination

process, exhibitors must submit show entries, and pay the affiliated entry fees, directly through each show's entry link by the entry deadline to participate.

- **Resources ALL families are encouraged to use the Rookie Guide and specie checklists!
- ***First Steps Exhibitors need to have completed their YQCA training for 2024 and downloaded their certificate before beginning the nomination process. Families should also locate their KSU Family Name and Nomination # before logging in to ShoWorks.
- *ALL SUBMISSIONS MUST BE ACCOMPANIED BY OFFICIAL DNA HAIR SAMPLE ENVELOPES (PURCHASED IN 2022 OR 2023).*

YOUTH THE QUALITY CARE SANIMALS

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national, multi-species quality assurance program for youth ages 7 to 18. This program promotes food safety, animal well-being and character development. With YQCA, you'll discover what it takes to be an informed producer, consumer and employee of the agriculture and food industries.

YQCA is REQUIRED to be Eligible to Exhibit ALL ANIMAL EXHIBITS (Except Horses) at the Butler County 4-H Fair.

The YQCA Deadline for Participating in the 2024 Butler County 4-H Fair is May 30th, 2024 at 11:59 PM.

Youth are required to take YQCA in-person or online; if taken online, a certificate of completion must be submitted to the Extension Office at aemclaughlin@ksu.edu by May 31st at 11:30 a.m..

Is YQCA mandatory for all 4-H'ers?

YQCA is required to show animals at the Butler County 4-H Fair, the Kansas State Fair, and the Kansas Junior Livestock Show.

8-18 yr. olds must pass a web based or instructor led training. <u>7 year olds must attend an instructor led course.</u>

- How much does getting certified cost?
 - The online module certification is \$12, and the instructor-led training method of certification is \$3.
- Does the YQCA certification ID sync with 4-H online?
 - Yes, you will sign in using your 4-H Online information.
- I only show horses. Do I need to be YQCA certified?
 - No. Right now, YQCA, is not required for 4-H Horse Project Members.
 - Yes they do. Youth should re-certify around the same time they tested each year.

Do 4-H'ers need to update their YQCA certification number each year?

- Do I need to register before class?
 - Yes! You must register and pay online before attending an instructor-led class.
- Does Butler County 4-H get the registration money?
 No, all registration money is online and goes to YQCA.

 - No pens allowed to be used without deposit.
- Butler County Youth \$15/hd/species

- \$100 cash prize for Champion Breeding Goat and Ewe. \$50 cash prize for Reserve Grand Breeding Goat and Ewe

Check-In Information

- Trailers may arrive beginning at Noon Saturday
- Registration opens at 6:00 a.m. Sunday
- Swine checked-in by 8:00 a.m. (Show at 9:00 a.m.)
- Sheep & Goats checked-in by 10:00 a.m. (Sheep show 11am or 30 min after swine show. Goat show 15 min after completion of sheep show)

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- Butler County Black Gold Committee, Butler County 4-H, Butler County Extension Council, and the Butler County Fair Board are not responsible for any accidents.
- 2. Open to all current 4-H/FFA members 18 years and younger as of January 1, 2024. Out of State exhibitors are welcome!
- 3. All males must be castrated.
- 4. All animals must be owned and shown by the exhibitor & free of clinical signs of infestations or contagious diseases, infections and sickness
- Only one animal per exhibitor in Butler County classes.
- NO bedding allowed in the barns.
- Show from your trailer. A \$50 deposit/pen will be required the day of the show if you wish to stall in the barn. The deposit will be returned upon inspection of the designated pen being cleaned.
- Watch Facebook for updates.
- Declare your own weight by respective registration close times.
- 10. The show committee reserves the right to resolve all questions not covered in the rules, request to see registration papers, a weigh back, etc. and their decision is final.
- 11. Full fit for show for anyone who wants to fit!

PROSPECT SWINE

- Prospect market animals may be either sex. Barrows and Gilts will show together.
- Prospect market animals will show by breed but must have a minimum of 5 to make a breed class or will show as AOB.

PROSPECT SHEEP & MEAT GOATS

- Does and ewes must be born after Jan. 1, 2023.
- Prospect market animals may be either sex. Must have milk teeth.
- Exhibitors may brace animals, but all four feet must be on the ground. Show director has the right to disqualify any violators.
- 4. All market and breeding animals will be shown by weight. There will be no breed classes
- Market may not be shown in breeding and vice versa
